In Our Neighborhood

Snake Season

Spring is here and with it brings warm weather and hot, dry conditions in many areas of California. Human encounters with snakes are more likely as these elusive animals become more active this time of year. Most native snakes are harmless. The California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) recommends avoiding the rattlesnake, a venomous species, and knowing what to do in the rare event of a bite.

Rattlesnakes may be found in diverse habitats, from coastal to desert, and are widespread in California. They can be attracted to areas around homes with heavy brush or vegetation, under wood piles where rodents may hide, as well as well-manicured landscapes to bask in the sun.

Rattlesnakes are not generally aggressive, unless provoked or threatened, and will likely retreat if given space.

- Most bites occur when a rattlesnake is handled or accidentally brushed against by someone walking or climbing.
- Most bites occur between the months of April and October when snakes and humans are most active outdoors.
- On occasion, rattlesnake bites have caused severe injury even death.

The California Poison Control System notes that the chances of being bitten are small compared to the risk of other environmental injuries. The potential of encountering a rattlesnake should not deter anyone from venturing outdoors.

Do not attempt to touch or handle.

Who May Attend Meetings?

WHO MAY ATTEND MEETINGS?

Members Only. California's community associations are not part of the public sector; they are private membership organizations. As a result, the general public does not have a right to attend board or membership meetings. Unless an association's governing documents provide otherwise, the legal right to attend meetings as provided for the Open Meeting Act is reserved for members only. (Civ. Code §4925.)

- Spouses. Even though the legal right to attend board and membership meetings is reserved to members only, industry practice is to allow non-member spouses. A misbehaving spouse can be excluded for disruptive behavior.
- Renters. Because they are not members, renters do not have a legal right to attend board meetings. However, most boards allow tenants to attend board meetings and address the board during OPEN Forum, provided they are not disruptive.
- Lawyers. Industry practice is to prohibit non-member lawyers from attending board and membership meetings.
- Realtors. Nonmember Realtors do not have a legal right to attend board meetings even though they may do business in the development. At the board's discretion, however, they can attend.

DISRUPTIVE ATTENDEES. Disruptive attendees, despite their membership status, can be removed from meetings.
