Sewer Pump Station Upgrade

You've probably noticed the equipment moving on Sylvan Vista. Placer County is upgrading the access to the sewer pump station by creating a loop. A new road was completed extending Sylvan Glen Place, so trucks access the pump station without turning around or having to back out. The construction is almost completed.

Financial Update

Our financials were on track with revenue as of July 31st. The Board has worked hard to manage our Operating Expenses below budget in almost every account to help offset our overrun in Legal Expenses.

The membership took on the challenge of updating our Governing Documents to include Bylaws, CC&Rs and Architectural Rules. This was a planned project. The estimated cost was \$6,500 and we chose to incur that expense using Reserve funds from our treasury.

The unplanned legal expense involves the Edwards' dispute. That expense year to date is approximately \$10,000 in attorney fees. The ACC continues to work with the Edwards' and has approved the grading plan, drainage plan, driveway design and front landscaping plan. The ACC is confident the remaining issues will be resolved.

Unfortunately, these combined legal expenses of approximately \$16,500 will require a Special Assessment of \$500 for each lot anticipated to be assessed in October.

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Protecting Your Home From Fire

The wildfires that ravaged parts of California this year are making us all more aware of this real or potential threat. We experience several close fires every year. What can you do?

Here are 9 tips for designing a fire-smart landscape:

- Prune trees so the branches don't touch or overhang the house.
- Plan shrubs well away from the house.
- Dispose of debris by clearing away any potential "fuel".
- 4. Choose fire resistant plants.
- Keep your lawn mowed and well irrigated.
- 6. Keep your plants healthy.
- 7. Avoid flammable mulches.
- Replace wooden decks, fences, and boardwalks with nonflammable materials.
- Be smart. Evaluate your hoses and flammable materials.

Landscape Fences and Walls

As property owners, we do not always consider the potential that landscape fences and walls can have in contributing to the spread of a wildfire.

The common wooden postand-board fence can become
fuel for a wildfire, especially
when the fence is old and
weather-beaten, this type of
fence can also collect embers
and firebrands in a wildfire
and act as a horizontal ladder
fuel by allowing the fire to
travel along the fence toward
the main building.

Use noncombustible materials for fences and walls. Wood is the most combustible, while iron, concrete, stone, and masonry are noncombustible.
